

THE WHITE PAGE

Some of the Twin Cities' most intriguing and transgressive performers - including Shelby Richardson, Emily Gastineau, Genevieve Muench, and Lisa Channer - are taking on Basic Instinct. Yes, that one: the 1992 psychosexual thriller starring Sharon Stone, Michael Douglas, and some unforgettable imagery. This version, however, aims to turn that directorial vision on its head, leaving out the male characters and using the one hour and 20 minutes depicting women (within the two-and-a-half-hour movie) as the choreographic core of the performance.
